

## What you need to do:

Once per month, you will be expected to "post" on the Dolphin Project's Blog. The website can be found above. Kristen, one of the Dolphin Project's coordinators, has created the Blog, and is doing weekly "challenges". Make sure to comment under the correct "challenge". Students can blog weekly if they wish, but are only required to do one blog each

of the months of the Program. At the end of each month, students are required to hand in the attached sheet which lets me know when they blogged and which "challenge" they chose to focus on. The sheet can be handed in upon completion of the blog, but must be handed



in by the last day of each month. Only one blog is being required because students may not have Internet access at home. Having only one blog assigned will allow the students time to make a "post" using the Internet in school if needed (either in the Library or in their own classrooms. There is a place to ask the Survey Team questions by clicking "Ask Us Questions" on the blog.

## Internet Safety: Tips for Blogging

Even though the Dolphin Project's Blog has been created only for students participating in the program, it is still being published on the web. This means that there is a possibility that it might be viewed by people unknown to us. To keep our students safe, please keep in mind the following guidelines offered by "Safety Web": Use your "street smarts." Avoid

giving out any personal information like last names, addresses, school names, birthdays, etc. Remember that any content you post could pop up on an Internet search engine, and divulging personal facts could put you at risk for becoming a victim of cyberstalking.



Be mindful. Remember that anything you post online becomes permanent in cyberspace and has the potential of coming back to haunt you. (Plus your teacher will be reading it!!!) Imagine that a future employer or admissions counselor to your dream college is reading your blog because it's entirely possible that they will a few years down the line.
